## History Lesson America's Historic Triangle (Part 1 of 3)

Anybody wonder why we chose Virginia for our summer trip destination? Is it for the beautiful countryside? The soft, sandy beaches? The thrill of rides at Busch Gardens? Well, sure! It's all of that...and something else that happens to fit in very nicely with the mission of the Marquis. It's a trip about history!

Our first stop will be in Colonial Williamsburg<sup>1</sup>, and we'll be staying at a hotel there all week as well<sup>2</sup>. For those of you who have never been to Colonial Williamsburg, it is very, very, cool.<sup>3</sup>

Colonial Williamsburg is the historic district of the city of Williamsburg, Virginia. It is made up of many of the buildings which formed Virginia's capital in the years from about 1699 to 1780. There was a LOT going on in Virginia back in the 18th century, and Williamsburg was the center of government, education and culture in the colony. Thomas Jefferson, George Washington, Patrick Henry, James Monroe, James Madison, George Wythe and Peyton Randolph, along with many others, helped to mold the future of democracy from this important community.

The area now known as Colonial Williamsburg was originally established in 1632 as Middle Plantation. The property is located on high ground between the James & York rivers, which made it very defensible against attacks. Nearby Jamestown settlement was located on ...guess which river? That's right, the James river. Jamestown was the original seat of government, but the state house there had a bad habit of burning down and there were problems with mosquitoes and malaria in the hot, humid area around that city, so the House of Burgesses was several times moved to nearby Williamsburg. Eventually, everyone finally decided to just permanently declare Middle Plantation the official capital of the colony. Now, you can't really have a capital named something as unimpressive as "Middle Plantation," and so the city was renamed Williamsburg, in honor of King William III. Real estate values in Jamestown plunged<sup>4</sup>. The new site was described as a place where "clear and crystal springs burst from the champagne soil." I think we would all agree that is preferable to a place infested with mosquitoes and malaria.

During the American Revolutionary War the capital of Virginia was again moved for security reasons, this time to Richmond (about 55 miles away.) For many years thereafter, the old colonial buildings in the historical area of Williamsburg fell into a state of disrepair<sup>5</sup>. It's location on high ground made it not easily accessible by railway, and so while the towns around it benefitted from the industrial revolution, Williamsburg continued to exist as a sleepy little college town. Home to the College of William and Mary, and what was then called The Eastern Lunatic Asylum, it was hardly a hotspot of tourism.

Fortunately, a man came along with what we like to call, "that vision thing." His name was Dr. W.A.R<sup>6</sup>. Goodwin, and he recognized the enormous value of preserving the history of the area. Even more fortunately, he recognized the value of a wealthy benefactor, and he managed to capture the attention of one John D. Rockefeller, Jr. of the Standard Oil fortune. Both Goodwin and Rockefeller kept their plans to renovate the area a secret, while they quietly began to buy up property. Eventually people caught on and demanded to know what was up, forcing the men to reveal their plans in the summer of 1928.



During the restoration, over 720 buildings that postdated 1790 were demolished, many of which were from the 19th century. Over time, Colonial Williamsburg was nearly completely recreated. It now features shops, taverns and open-air markets in the colonial style. Two of the most prominent buildings, the Governor's Palace and the Capital Building, were reconstructed at the

original sites with the aid of period illustrations and written descriptions. Of the approximately 500 buildings in the historic area, 88 are original.

Today, Colonial Williamsburg is a combination of a historical landmark and a living history museum. With its historic significance in the development of democracy here in America, it and the surrounding areas have been the site of many summit meetings of world leaders. The community has hosted visiting royalty from several nations, including King Hussein of Jordan, Emperor Hirohito of Japan and Queen Elizabeth II, who paid two royal visits to Williamsburg. The Queen most recently visited in May of 2007 during the 400th anniversary of the founding nearby Jamestown Settlement<sup>7</sup>.

When visiting Colonial Williamsburg, you'll find a community that looks very much the way it would have in the 18th century. Historical re-enactors move about demonstrating the various aspects of life in colonial times. Special tours and programs are offered that allow visitors to explore different themes in detail, including trials, music, and a ghost walk! Woouooooo.

Of course, no colonial reenactment would be complete without a fife and drum corps, and The Colonial Williamsburg Fife and Drum Corps is one of the finest there is. They perform at many special occasions, and on each Saturday during the summer months they perform their Saturday March through the grounds of Colonial Williamsburg. This August, we have been invited to join them and this marks the first time in history the Marquis of Granby has been asked to do so.



We hope that every Marquis member who is eligible will join us on this trip and we're going to do everything possible to make sure anyone who *wants* to go is *able* to go. There will be fundraisers, and the value in many members Enrichment accounts have already built up with nearly enough funds to cover the entire cost of the trip. If you want to come but you are worried about the expense, please see Mrs. Lampert and she will help in any way she can. Remember, Colonial Williamsburg is just *one part* of the terrific trip we have planned!
